
Was Sin Inevitable?

Thanks for your question. From my understanding sin was not inevitable, but possible.

The possibility of sin existed, because God grants His intelligent creatures genuine freedom, which means freedom to rebel against Him. But sin was not inevitable as there is no reason that any creature should ever rebel against God as God is perfect, loving, giving, kind, and gracious in all His dealings. There was no flaw or defect in any of God's actions and thus no reason for sin to exist. In fact, if a reason could be found, then sin could be justified.

The reason it has taken the full revelation of God to solve the sin problem is because of the basis for the rebellion. Satan's rebellion is based on lies about God. When the lies about God are believed trust in God is broken and rebellion incited. The only way to win trust is by the revelation of truth. Trust cannot be won by the exercise of coercive power or threats. Therefore, once Satan did rebel and told lies about God the only way to resolve the problem was to meet those lies by the full revelation of truth.

The revelation of truth was all that was needed to secure unfallen beings in their loyalty to God. However, once Adam and Eve sinned the very nature of mankind was changed and the revelation of truth alone was not sufficient to resolve mankind's sin problem.

For mankind the revelation of truth was only the first step needed to win us to trust, which of course is essential. But the human condition had to be remedied.
